 of getting his support. The greatest  
 obstacle & that is that Koramangh &  
 he are deadly foes personally and  
 professionally & I do not think the  
 breach between them can ever be  
 healed. I cannot say much for  
 our prospects as far, but I will  
 live in hope & please God, do my  
 best & succeed. Both the wife and  
 myself are thankful it would have  
 been better for us to have stayed  
 in Sydney. But we seemed fated  
 to come here, somehow, I was  
 going back for I remember me to  
 Dr. Hobaran, but as the evening  
 is quiet I will drop him a line  
 too. Hope soon be able to settle  
 that old affair which is the most  
 unpleasant memory there of Inorunga.
